Warm Decembers is a film made by artist and filmmaker Lucy Beech. The film is inspired by a poem titled *The Warm Decembers* that was written by Eve Kosofsky Sedgwick. It took the writer nine years to complete this work. Eve Kosofsky Sedgwick included her notes at the end of the poem, which is interesting and unusual because notes are often thrown away or excluded, usually seen as waste. Lucy Beech's film is a visual interpretation of this poem and its notes. For the artist, the poem shows a process of crisis. Life's tough moments, uncomfortable feelings, or changes in the way we feel about ourselves – do these experiences in life stay with us or become waste?

One of the side characters in the poem is called Beatrix. The artist made Beatrix the lead character of the film. Beatrix is experiencing moments of crisis, and is going through a difficult period of change. These difficulties affect both the mind and the body.

The image above shows us a still image from the film. We see Beatrix, her nephew, and her father, who is standing at the table. In this scene, Beatrix describes to us a dream she had about her father, her aunt, and her nephew.
